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1a. Brief description of the project:

REDLAD is awarded a grant to support the development of a Summit of the Americas civil society coordination mechanism to ensure that the civil society organization (CSO) community in the region has a meaningful and institutionalized role in the Summit process. This by facilitating systematic consultations with a representative group of civil society and providing technical assistance to CSOs needing to build capacity and better engagement that allow them to monitor the Summit process.

1b. Collaboration and partnerships: For this period of time the Team has strengthen the contact with each stakeholder involved for the success of the project:

Collaboration and Partnerships by the Consortium:

- During February and March the Consortium decided to look for national focal points that can support the regional work nationally. When assessing the budget the Consortium realized that one of the challenges was to identify how to spend the travel expenses with efficiency. With that in mind they created a focal point strategy by contacting national organizations which can support the project in their territories. So, each Consortium member selected a couple of organizations with political and technical capacity to be focal points. This focal points (Enc 1) will be given a letter that would certify their condition of focal point of the project, they will also be presented with their Country Permanent Representatives at the OAS. This letters are expected to be sent on April. Additionally there will be another type of agreements to sign on May with each national focal points.
- South Cone Semillas para la Democracia: During March this organization contacted other organizations in Paraguay, Chile, Argentina and Uruguay. So far there are focal points elected in Argentina (Directorio Legislativo), in Chile (Fundación Multitudes) and in Uruguay probably with the organization CAINFO, which has not confirmed yet. In Brazil the organization is still trying to identify a national partner. Semillas para la Democracia has commented their interest in organize their first regional meeting in Uruguay at the end of April.

In Paraguay, Semillas para la Democracia has established contact with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs with the intention of presenting the project and explore possible official support. They have told the team that they do not recognize the mandates of Panama as official mandates.

<u>Central America - CECADE</u>: was very active in March as well, specially in Mexico where there a two
organizations that are interested in foster the project in that country as focal points, they are CESEM Centro de Servicios Municipales and the Equipo Puebla DECA. Other organizations such as Defensores
de DDHH en San Cristóbal de las Casas, DPLF - Due Process of Law Foundation and IFES International Foundation for Electoral System, has been contacted and are interested in participate in
the project.

The Project's Director strengthened the relations with the second layer of organizations in the project, one of them is the Consejo Regional Indígena y Popular (CRIPX, Mexico). Taking advantage of a

meeting they were organizing from the 10th to the 11th of March, named "The right to preview consultation process of indigenous people in Mexico", CRIPX and CECADE developed a Mexican indigenous consultation on March the 12th which is nowadays the first consultation of the project's implementation.

Additionally CECADE facilitated the indigenous meeting at Muna (Yucatan) where it was held a consultatio, a general description could be seen in: http://www.redlad.org/2016/04/grupo-focal-pasca-pueblos-indigenas.html.

- Andean Region Redlad: The organization in charge of the Andean Region (Democracia y Desarrollo International) decided to step a side of the Consortium but to collaborate in 2018 for the Summit of the Americas arrangements. Meanwhile Redlad has assumed the leadership on this region and has been establishing contact with organizations from Bolivia, Perú, Venezuela and Ecuador. So far Redlad has managed to set three focal points, one in Bolivia (Fundación Construir), and two in Ecuador (CEDEAL and Ciudadanía y Desarrollo). It was also identified one organization in Venezuela that could take the lead in that country (Transparencia Venezuela), but they are having second thoughts due to the rejection of the flag and logo waiver. In Colombia, it is more likely that the focal point will be the Confederación Colombiana de ONG (CCONG) but they are organizing the International Civic Society Week and asked to discuss their participation in May.
- <u>Caribbean Region Fondation Espoir:</u> in order to re take the process in the Caribbean Region the
 project's team has facilitated all the documents and layers of the project, so the organization Director
 can understand the project and start its work in the region. In april, during the International Civil Society
 Week there would be a meeting between Cubans and the Foundation Director in order to establish
 partnerships.

Collaboration and Partnerships by the Team Project with OAS:

- On January the 4th, Gina Romero, had a meeting with Ambassador James Lambert (Secretary of Hemispheric Affairs) and Jane Thery (Director of the Department of Summits of the Americas) in Washington. In this meeting the OAS made some recommendations about the project such as considering the successful cases of citizen participation within the OAS, and to amplify the scope of the project to other scenarios besides the Summit of the Americas, including the ministerial meetings and the Assemblies.
- On January the 8th, Gina Romero had a meeting with the Permanent Mission of Peru in the OAS in Washington. The intention of this meeting was to present the project and inquire about the planning process of the 2018 Summit of the Americas. In the meeting the Mission said they have not started a planning process, they link this process with the results of the presidential elections. However, they emphasized in the capacity and prior experience in organizing high quality events. About the project they requested more information in order to share it with the Ministry of International Relations of Peru.
- On January the 8th Gina Romero met the Executive Secretariat for Integral Development (SEDI), Ideli Salvati. Ms Salvati mentioned one survey that they were holding within the OAS that helped to identify all the dialogues between the OAS and Civil Society Organizations. As a preliminary result they identified there are other scenarios where the civil society participation has a major impact rather than in the Summit of the Americas, such as the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights (IACHR), where there is a constant exchange between the it and the CSO's. The SEDI have not share the results yet.

Collaboration and Partnerships by the Team Project with other stakeholders:

In January's report, the project's team wrote about a possible meeting with CSO's from Panamá with
the intention of gathering the previous experience of civil society incidence in the 2015 Summit of the
Americas. The festivities and the period of vacations impeded the meeting arrangements. As a
consequence the project team looked for alternatives, independently organized virtual meetings with

Magaly Castillo, Alianza Projusticia (January 27th), who commented the experience they had in the Summit. She explained the role that each part (OAS, Panamanian Foreign Affairs Ministry and CSO group) played in the Summit's organization, as well as the challenges they faced due to the lack of timely information and of the 'politicization' the Summit had for the presence of Cuban Government. in relation to the consultation with CSO within Panamá, they did a big effort for organizing three national forums in which they had the opportunity of collecting inputs from the panamanian CSO to be delivered at the Summit. Now, they want to organize a forum one year after the Summit to do a follow up on the advance in those inputs and demands.

- On February the 2nd, Redlad's team had a meeting with Pablo de la Vega, the regional coordinator of the Inter-American Platform for Human Rights, Democracy and Development (PIDHDD), as well as with Billy Navarrete, the Ecuatorian representative, to present PASCA and inviting them to be part of the project. They have been disseminating the project's information and activities with all their members and will participate in its activities.
- On February the 17th Gina Romero, Project's Director, had an informal meeting with César Darío Escobar, from Colombia's Foreign Ministry. In a short conversation Gina presented PASCA and coordinated a formal meeting to be held on February.
- On February the 24th Gina Romero had an informal conversation with Hugo Woods, from Panama's Foreign Ministry and they agreed to have a formal meeting on March the 2nd, in this meegin Hugo explained his experience organizing the last Summit. About the number of participating organizations at the Summit he pointed out the importance of working with the Foreign Ministries in order to ask for spots and obtain approval. Another two relevant points were, firstly the lack of follow up from the CSO to the post-summit, there is a network from youth but not from CSO, and second one, the current debate about whether or not the mandates are valid for every single government which surely will affect the mandates monitoring.
- On February the 29th, Redlad's base team had a meeting with Moisés Sánchez from the Regional Alliance for Free Expression and Information with the objective of presenting PASCA and exploring the interest of the Alliance to participate in its activities. Initially Moisés agreed in replying the project's information among its members and also in participating in the dialogue for the creation of the mechanism for CSO participation.
- Regarding the International Civil Society Week Redlad achieved to establish a partnership with the
 organization Civil Rights Defenders in order to sponsor the attendance of 8 cubans for the Week and to
 co-organize a Cuban consultation and a meeting with the caribbean coordinator Hans Tippenhauer from
 the Fondation Espoir.

International Civil Society Week (ICSW)

From the 24th to the 28th of April, it will be held in Bogotá the International Civil Society Week (ICSW). Taking advantage of the presence in Bogotá of around 200 latin civil society representatives, Redlad will be leading some activities. Before to list them it is important to underline the partnership achieved with Freedom House and Civil Rights Defenders in order to work in consultations with Cuban CSO representatives, both organizations have agreed to organize activities with 16 activist they will be bringing to Colombia. The activities to develop are listed below:

- Seminar on lessons to the OAS from different experiences of CSO participation in Multilateral scenarios. This event will be held in April the 26th.
- Hemispheric PASCA consultation to create a dialogue with civil society organizations about the structure of the Civil Society Council, about the mandates monitoring and possible topics for the 2018 Summit of the Americas.

- Cuban special consultation: organized between Redlad, Freedom House and Civil Rights Defenders. It will count with the participation of around 15 cuban activists that Redlad's partners will bring to Bogotá .2nd Consortium meeting: to follow the project implementation.
- Meeting with national focal points: a meeting with the national focal points from the andean region.
- 2. Executive summary: During the period of this report, the team worked in four different types of activities:

A. Reports:

On January the 25th the project's team uploaded in Grants Solution the first quarterly report of activities. On February the 15th the project's team sent January's monthly report.

On March the 15th the project's team sent February's monthly report.

B. Designing and update of internal documents:

- Stakeholder Mapping: as it was mentioned in february he Consortium decided to do first a consultation among its members for professionals that could be able to produce this Study. As result, the Consortium decided to hire Julio Alfaro (El Salvador). Initially, the Team project wanted to take advantage of the collection of data through the Stakeholders Mapping, to ask the CSO about their interest in the Summit of Americas, their motivation in monitoring the Summit's commitments, their networks and strengths. However, Julio Alfaro had difficulties developing the instruments to collect the data and defining the methodology to apply it. Therefore the Team project decided to organize their databases (which have almost 900 CSO) and develop the online survey that was launched on March 16th (http://ow.ly/ZsUsN). Since that date, until March 31, the online consultation was filled by 64 organizations.
- The Comparative Study on Best Practices and Lessons in CSO is been carried on by Paulo Gonzalez,
 who was selected by the Consortium to do it. There are some advances which have had comments and
 suggestions by the Project Team. As it was written, the main results of this study will be presented during
 the International Civil Society Week in order to socialize the project and promote the discussion about
 this topic.
- Focal Group: following the strategy mentioned in prior reports, the Consortium has identified some
 events and international meetings where consultations can take place. The first consultation was in
 March 12 during an international meeting of indigenous people about the right of prior consultation in
 Muna, México. The workshop was facilitated by CECADE, the results of the Focal Group offered
 valuable opinions that are presented in the following power point presentation (Enclose 2).
- Communication Strategy: an important part of the communication strategy is the development of a
 Manual of graphic identity which unifies criteria, colors, fonts and more important the usage of the logos
 and the institutional image of the Flag of the United States of America. The manual is already developed
 (Enc. 8). According to this manual there have been created templates to use in Word and Power Point
 documents, as models for Consortium and focal points organizations.
- In March the Project's Team developed a first Proposal for the Mechanism of Participation of Civil Society (Enc. 7). This proposal was done according to the inputs from CECADE and from the the reviewing process of other experiences on civil society participation in international initiatives such as the Open Government Partnership, Publish What You Pay and the Extractives Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI). This proposal has been discussed with the Consortium whom gave feedback about it, their opinions would be include in a second proposal.

C. Consortium update:

• In the last quarterly report it was informed the situation with the organization GOAL from the Caribbean region (Antillean region) who said they couldn't sign the sub-award agreement and neither to receive funds from the DOS due to a 'conflict of interest'. Redlad asked Participación Ciudadana (Dominican Republic) to take the lead, but they refused the proposal because they do not have the language capacities or the institutional capability. This was informed to the DOS on the meeting we had on

February the 3rd. After some consultations, Foundation Espoir-Jeune Ayiti (Haití) accepted being the new Consortium representative in the Caribbean, this was informed to the DOS on February the 22nd. Espoire's Director, Hans Tippenauer, is fluent on French, Spanish and English which is an advantage to the communication and relationships in the Caribbean region.

• Two Subaward agreements had been signed (Enc. 3, Enc. 4): CECADE (El Salvador) and Semillas para la Democracia (Paraguay). Following the signing the project's team asked them the development of a work plan, (Enc. 5 CECADE, Enc. 6 Semillas) to establish activities and timelines, so far CECADE has deliver the work plan, its example has been taken for Semillas who is still working on it and some suggestions are being added to the detailed plan of the project.

Taking into account the mandatory use of the Flag of the United States of the America, the Project's Team is developing a modification in the subawards agreements in order to state this obligation as mandatory for the project implementation.

Another important update is the situation occurred with the organization from Perú D&D - Democracia &
Desarrollo International. On the 9th of March the organization Director, Elaine Ford, wrote a formal letter
directed to the project's director in which she exposes the reasons to withdraw their participation in the
project, she explained the decision came from the organization board who determined 1) their lack of
capacity to achieve the project goals and 2) they willingness to foster their digital expertise within Perú.
The letter was consulted and accepted with the Consortium.

E. Other Actions

- An intern, student of Government and International Relations, has been selected to help with the project
 activities, his name is Felipe Caicedo (Enc. 9). He will not be paid by the project, but will be a very useful
 help specially for research activities. Felipe will be supporting the team in the following activities:
 - 1) Networking connections of the project as well as support the data base updating.
 - 2) Analysis of Latin American context and produce short articles.
 - 3) Promotion of partnerships for the project's activities.
 - 4) Meetings arrangements.
- The project's team has found an office and is currently working from there, there is proper workplace to develop the project, it is located at the Calle 69 No. 4-68 office 202 in Bogotá.
- The webmaster/communication official has been selected and has been hired, his name is Daniel Santiago Mateus Cabra (Encl. 10). The call to apply was opened for two weeks and it was communicated on Redlad's Facebook profile. 72 CV were received and they were registered in a table (Enc. 11) to compare education, experience and pertinence of the profiles to the project's requirements. There were selected four candidates for interview and three of them were interviewed by Gina Romero and Yolima García.
- In order to work on the information management of the project and improve the communication for the project's development, the project's team acquired 9 licences of Google Apps for Work. Initially this allow the project's team and the consortium to have email accounts to foster the relations with other organizations as well as access to shared space in the cloud through Google Drive, working collaboratively on documents and use other apps, which facilitate the project's implementation.
- As a complementary task of the Communication Strategy the project team has started to produce
 information about the project development as well as about topics around the Summit of the Americas.
 As a result the team has developed a bulletin 'Entre Regiones' which would be sent each month and
 have agreed to publish some articles in the <u>Pulso Ciudadano</u> magazine.

5. Challenges, lessons learned and best practices related to your project:

- The situation in the Caribbean Region was a challenge already solved. However the catching up of the new organization has to be very soon in order to keep the oncoming activities.
- The new situation that is been handled is the withdraw of Perú. REDLAD has assumed the leadership of the Andean Region and is working to establish national focal points.
- One practice that has been accepted -as it was explained before- is the consolidation of national focal
 points, so far each organization from the Consortium is looking for national organizations and some alliances
 has been established. However the Consortium members have mentioned the difficulties when telling the
 project's benefits, some organizations hesitate to cooperate if there is not enough budget to work nationally.
- The Consortium members have identified the challenge of getting engage other civil society organizations, especially those whom the consortium members are expecting to collaborate as focal points nationally, however they have managed to show the benefits of the project, moreover about the opportunity of having a wider influence with their participation.
- Another challenge is the accomplishment of the project's timeline. It means to consider different rhythms of
 response from organizations in different regions and countries, also, that these organizations have their
 own agenda and previous commitments, and it is needed to negotiate with them their time and attract their
 interest
- The Consortium have been finding that some Foreign Affairs Ministries do not recognize Panama's Mandates, which means they will not present reports on its advances.
- From best practices it is important to mention the strategy of watching international events that gather civil society organizations in which the Consortium can develop hemispheric or regional consultations.
- One of the best practices came from the advice of CECADE. They purpose to have letters of certification
 for the national focal points as well as introduction letters to the permanent representatives at the OAS. With
 this formal presentation and accreditation the focal points can feel identified with the project and with its
 support.
- Another important challenge is use of the US. Flag, for some organization such as the ones located in leftwing countries such as Venezuela and some from the caribbean, it can affect their credibility from the Civil Society and and a problematic situation with their governments.

6. Upcoming Events:

- In the first week of April Redlad's team is planning, taking advantage of the CSO representatives that
 will be in Washington for the IAHRC hearings, Redlad is planning to have: i) a Hemispheric consultation,
 ii) meetings with organization that can become focal points in Canada, the USA and Brazil, iii). Meeting
 with representatives from indigenous groups from Perú, Panamá and Ecuador.
- Meetings at the International Civil Society Week (ICSW) as well as the second Consortium Meeting in the last week of April 2016 in Bogotá.
- The organization Semillas para la Democracia will organize a sub-regional meeting on May 2016, its logistics preparation will start on April.

7. Timeline

In general, the project is advancing according to the approved timeline. However, there are some notes which were included in the monthly reports on January and February. Please follow the numbers in front of the correspondent activities and its notes:

- 1. Considering the holidays between december and January and the difficulties to contact most of the organizations which were going to be included in the stakeholders mapping, it was postponed to starts at the end of January and during February. As it was exposed at the point 2B in this report, at first one consultant was hired to work on it, but then it was developed an alternative approach using databases collected by the project's team and applying an online survey which is still opened.
- 2. To optimize time, resources and contact with the CSO, at the beginning it was decided to develop one single instrument to collect information about this and other issues. It is going to be applied

simultaneously to the mapping stakeholders' instruments. However, later the team project realized that it was not practical. So there is a delay because of that decision. From the results of the survey, it is going to be developed the analysis of relations and relevance, with the support of the Consortium members.

- Considering that this product, the comparative study started three months after the initial date (on February 2016), its results are going to be obtained on April. Even, it is going to be presented during the International Civil Society Week (ICSW) in Bogota, on last week of that month.
- Doing the detailed working plan of the project, it was found that this activity (programmed on december 2015) must appear later, once the Civil Society Council is elected. So, it was moved to September of 2016.
- This mechanism will be developed during the consultation process with the CSO. The first input came come from the first focus group in Mexico on March, and it was developed a proposal for the collaborative work with CSO organizations and other stakeholders.
- 6. The Team project identified that the methodologies will be developed and improved according to the project's performance. Therefore, this activity continues to respond to the permanent project's demand.
- 7. As part as the baseline it was conducted a survey to the Consortium members on their first meeting on December 2015. Also the current survey to civil society organizations is collecting useful information for this purpose. The comparative study and the stakeholders mapping will complete the landscape.
- 8. In spite of the structure of the databases was built on January and improved on February, the databases are not finished yet, daily, they are being enlarged and updated from the project performance and contacts.
- Considering that the sub-agreements were signed on February, this activity (planned for December 2015) started on March.
