### 1a. Brief description of the project:

REDLAD is awarded a grant to support the development of a Summit of the Americas civil society coordination mechanism to ensure that the civil society organization (CSO) community in the region has a meaningful and institutionalized role in the Summit process. This by facilitating systematic consultations with a representative group of civil society and providing technical assistance to CSOs needing to build capacity and better engagement that allow them to monitor the Summit process.

### 1b. Collaboration and partnerships:

The most significant events for the project during this quarter were related to prepare the participation of civil society at the VIII Summit of the Americas on April.

#### North America - REDLAD:

During January, America Solidaria's local offices in Chile and Uruguay established contact with PASCA's focal points in these countries to better understand how the project works and upcoming actions, and to invite them to be part in the national councils and in OAS' coalition process. They also subscribe to be part of Redlad's Coalition.

#### Central America and Mexico - CECADE:

In **El Salvador**, on February the Focal Point sent an updated report of the exercise of monitoring mandates (annex 1) and some recommendations for the Summit (annex 2) elaborated at the OAS national consultation meeting. On March, the national council of civil society selected two members to attend at the Summit of the Americas.

In **Honduras**, the situation has remained worrying after the presidential elections and the fraud allegations surrounding it (which were detailed in the 2017 Fourth Quarter Report). Adding to this situation, our focal point organization is being accused of allegedly promoting destabilization activities in certain regions of the country, which might entail risks for them in the coming months.

Because the Focal Point didn't send the national report related with the monitoring of mandates and civil society recommendations, it was not considered to get support to attend at the Summit; nevertheless, the focal point's representative attend most of the virtual meetings of the Citizen Forum.

In **Mexico**, the Mexican Ministry of Foreign Affairs has advised the Peruvian Government continuously on the organization of the 2018 Summit, with the lessons from the 2017 General Assembly. On February 22nd there was in Mexico City an informative session about the oncoming Summit of the Americas, which was asked by the Mexican Ministry of Foreign Affairs to the OAS and with the participation of CSO. Although in the timetable published by the Summit Secretariat, were planned various national meetings, this is the only one we know about.

In **Nicaragua**, our focal point advanced its conversations with government officials to solve the impasse that prevented them from obtaining its CSO certification to legally operate within the country (this situation was explained in the October 2017 report). On February, it was called by the Ministry of Governing to review the procedure which has limited them to keep the certification to operate legally within the country. On February 26th Red Local organized a meeting with some civil society organizations to discuss about enabling environment and prepare recommendations toward the Summit. One member of the Focal Point team is going to attend at the Summit.

### **Southern Cone and Brazil - Semillas para la Democracia:**

In **Argentina**, the focal point delivered its reports for the mandates of Energy and Security (annex 3), which join the reports on Citizen Participation, Civic Space and Environment that had been delivered in June 2017. They also delivered its list of Civil Society recommendations for the 2018 Summit of the Americas (annex 4). The focal point joined the Coalition 3 of Transparency, Open Government and Public Participation, and would bring two persons to attend at the Summit, considering the quality of their reports.

In **Brazil**, on February we received the report of monitoring about Civic Space (annex 5 - PT), on March, it was delivered the report about education (annex 6 - PT). Two persons from the Focal Point would attend at the Summit.

In **Chile**, on January 12th the focal point delivered its reports on Hemispheric Cooperation (annex 7), Education (annex 8), Energy (annex 9), Democratic Governance (annex 10), Migration (annex 11), Health (annex 12), and Security (annex 13), which join the reports on Citizen Participation and Environment that were delivered on June 2017. One person from the Focal Point is going to attend at the Summit.

In **Paraguay**, in our last report we unintentionally omitted to mention that the focal point delivered in December 2017 its reports on Citizen Participation, Civic Space, Democratic Governance, Education, Health, Migration, Security (annex 14). On March, we received their agenda of recommendations of civil society (annex 15).

In **Uruguay**. After the former Focal Point withdraw, Alfredo Toledo, from "Fundación Salud" in Uruguay, confirmed his organization's interest in working with the Base Team as a Focal Point. Given the current focus on the upcoming Summit for the project, a discussion of what such a role might entail will be scheduled for a later date.

### **Andean Region - DESCO:**

In **Bolivia**, the focal point and two CSO from the national scenario of civil society joined the coalition 3 of Transparency, Open Government and Public Participation. On early February the Focal Point sent the report about the accomplishment of the government in energy (annex 16 - ES) and at the end of the month it sent the report on migration (annex 17 - ES). Two persons would have support to attend at the Summit.

In **Colombia**, after reflecting on its participation in the initial conversations regarding the "Transparency, Open Government and Public Participation" coalition, our focal point in the country decided to change their

participation to the coalition named “Comprehensive Care to Newborns, Children and Teens with Regards to Corruption and Sustainable Development”, as it was proposed and is being coordinated by an organization from Colombia with long ties to CCONG (our focal point). The Focal Point seems not to be interested at all in attending the Summit.

In **Ecuador**, the focal point delivered its list of Civil Society recommendations for the 2018 Summit of the Americas on January 31st (annex 18). Two persons would have support to attend at the Summit, however, one of them is waiting for the confirmation email from the OAS.

In **Peru**, our partners are identifying private sector organizations that might be interested in partnering with the project. The main speaker at SIRG meetings from the private sector is the Confederación Nacional de Instituciones Empresariales Privadas (CONFIEP), which is actually hostile to Civil Society activities. On January 23rd, our partners attended a cocktail at the US Embassy in preparation for the Summit. The political climate remains agitated after the December events involving the pardoning of Alberto Fujimori and the ensuing Civil Society protests. On January 31st the Ministry of Foreign Affairs held a meeting with 55 participants (most of them known to our focal point organization) during which it reviewed the coalition-forming process. The Focal Point and Consortium members have been focused on permanent communication with the Peruvian Ministry of Foreign Affairs to coordinate participation of civil society at SIRG meeting and in the oncoming Summit. DESCO is leading the coalition 25 of the Citizen Forum of the Americas. They attended at the SIRG meetings on March 21st.

In **Venezuela**, the focal point concentrated in coordinating the Transparency Coalition, which meant incorporating three new organizations during January (for a total of 43 CSOs from 19 countries), making sure participants registered themselves at the OAS and sharing information as it became available. The group agreed to speak about the following six topics during its participation at the Summit: 1) Access to public information, transparency, freedom of expression and open data; 2) Strengthening the independence and power of justice systems in the fight against corruption; 3) Open public procurement; 4) Open and participatory budget; 5) Transparent campaign funding; 6) International cooperation.

They updated some indicators and analysis of the monitoring report sent on 2017 and they submitted the updated report on late March. It includes new development about Migration (annex 19 - ES). It is remarkable the quality of Venezuelan report of monitoring and the effort to collect pertinent information to demonstrate the lack of commitment of the government about the mandates. Two persons have been selected to attend at the Summit.

### **Caribbean - Fondation Espoir:**

From twelve Caribbean CSO interested in join a coalition about sustainable development and climate change on December, during the process to be registered at the Summit, only three of them completed it: Fondation Espoir (Haiti’s Focal Point), DNCW - Dominica National Council of Women (Dominica), CNA - Caribbean Netball Association (St. Lucia).

In some cases, the CSO seem to have low motivation to attend at the Summit, as well the OAS is not significant at all for Caribbean countries closer to the European Union. Other CSO expressed they have not funds to go to the Summit and others remained silent. Some countries affected by the hurricanes season are not recovered yet. I.e. the base team did the registration in behalf of the Dominica National Council of Women (DNCW), which office was affected by the natural disaster, lost official documents and have technical difficulties to access to Internet.

From PASCA project, we did arrangements to support the participation of Wilbert St. Fort, coordinator of OREDEM and head of the 14th coalition and Vanya David, from DNCW - Dominica National Council of

Women. Additionally, we have been solving questions about the OAS public timetable and preparatory issues which have not been clarified by the OAS's official communications.

### **Collaboration and Partnerships by the Team Project with other stakeholders:**

On January 20th the closing of the registration period for CSO representatives wanting to attend the official Summit events, and on January 26th the period for delivering the first draft of each coalition's position paper, which occurred. Both processes were somewhat convoluted since most focal points were still away on holiday, so registrations were only made at the last minute. Regarding the position papers, most coalition coordinators prepared a draft which was discussed among the respective members, except for the coalition on "Transparency, Open Government and Public Participation" which presented an account of the process of conforming the coalition in alliance with another partner.

On February 7th the Summit Secretariat opened one day of extemporary application to the Summit. The base team spread out the message to motivate those organizations which did not complete the register on first term.

On February 19th the IACHR organized in Bogota a round table with experts about Human Rights and Corruption. Gina Romero attended to it and contacted IACHR members to present their report on the frame of PASCA - REDLAD agenda during the Summit of the Americas.

From February 22nd to March 2nd the IACHR has the 167 period of sessions in Bogota, Colombia. The Base Team attended to different meetings there. Gina Romero gave a brief message in behalf of PASCA process at the meeting between IACHR and civil society on February 28th.

At the end of february the Coalition Citizens Observatory for an Open Parliament contacted other coalitions' leaders to suggest a meeting between coalitions to have a common approach and to meet at the Summit of the Americas. It was welcoming by CSO which see this scenario such as an opportunity of networking and incidence, but it is polemical for the Summit Secretariat, because that office is afraid of confrontation between opposed poles and has rejected initiatives like that. However, in the agenda of REDLAD - PASCA, there are open meetings (annex 20). The Base Team and focal points have been involved in that discussions by chat and e-mail.

On March 13th to 16th Gina Romero went to Brazil to join the Worldwide Social Forum, in Salvador de Bahía. It was an opportunity for networking and inspirational to offer different scenarios of dialogue.

On February 8th (annexes 24 and 25) and March 21st there was another participation of civil society representatives at the SIRG meeting. It was a milestone, because it is the first time it occurs. Also it was the first time that governments heard civil society recommendations before closing their declaration.

### **Population groups**

**Religion:** Coordinating with GEMRIP (the Multidisciplinary Study Group on Religion and Public Action, or *Grupo de Estudios Multidisciplinarios sobre Religión e Incidencia Política*) it was held a meeting in San Jose, Costa Rica, on February 26th to debate about Religion and Politics: Latin America lessons and challenges facing Costa Rican conjuncture. It was an activity also to collect inputs for the coalition number 10th "Religions, Beliefs and Spiritualities in dialog with Civil Society".

**LGBTIQ:** From February 3rd to 11th, Andrés Rivera, LGBTI coordinator of REDLAD, organized various activities in Lima with activists and local organizations to collect inputs for the Summit and create an structure of coordination. On February 7th there was a meeting with Kela Leon, from the Peruvian Ministry

of Foreign Affairs, to present some request to guarantee more inclusive registration and participation of LGBTI population at the Summit.

It was supported the creation of a national platform LGTBIQ+ which represents all sexuality orientations and diverse identities. They are going to look for incidence toward the Summit of the Americas, other OAS' scenarios, UN and national spaces, from a perspective of Human Rights. Besides, as a result of these activities, Redlad now is in charged of training all the personnel from the hotel where the Civil Society activities is going to be held, and from the foreign affair ministry, in sexual diversity and how to avoid discrimination.

**Indigenous:** Romel Gonzalez, REDLAD's Indigenous Peoples coordinator, has been in touch with the base team to define who members of the coalition 24th, which he leads, are going to attend at the Summit.

**Afrodescendants:** A group of afrodescendant people's organizations from several countries organized themselves to present a coalition for the Summit.

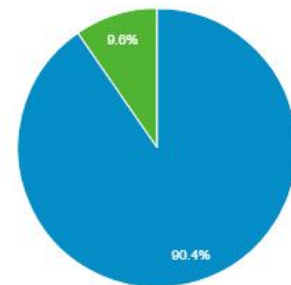

## **2. Executive summary:** During the period of this report, the team worked in different activities.

A. Reports: the report for the Fourth Quarter of 2017 was submitted on January and monthly reports were written on February and March.

### B. Designing and update of internal documents:

- On January we received some reports of monitoring mandates and agendas of recommendations, which was referred in the annexes 1st to 20th.
- The base team contributed to the concept papers presented by the following coalitions:
  - Citizen Forum of the Americas (annex 26)
  - Alliance against corruption but for Sustainable Development in Central America, North America and the Caribbean (annex 27)
- The base team wrote several messages to motivate PASCA's CSO and partners' coalitions to fill the OAS' application form to be registered at the Summit (annex 28).
- The Base Team did a systematization of the 14 monitoring reports received (annex 29) and the recommendations for the Summit (annex 30).
- The Base Team prepared a programme of activities for the Summit (annex 20) and designed some interactive spaces into the frame of the big event called: "Foro Ciudadano de las Américas. Encuentro de Sociedad Civil en tiempos extraordinarios" (Citizen Forum of the Americas. Civil Society meeting in extraordinary times).
- We compiled lists of members of six coalitions and elaborated a report to be considered in a plan of relationship and incidence with stakeholders toward the summit (annex 31).

### C. Consortium update:

- All the proposed coalitions were eventually accepted by the OAS, although most had to form alliances with other similarly-minded groups. From 28 approved coalitions, 8 = 28,6% are close (integrated by PASCA's Consortium members and Focal Points), 7 = 25% are related, 2 = 7.1% are clearly distant due to their scope and 11 = 39.3% are pending to research.
- There were online meetings of members of the Citizen Forum of the Americas on February 2nd (annex 21) and March 6th to concrete details about the activities which would be held in Lima, Peru (annex 22 Presentation, annex 23 resume).
- On February 8th Gina Romero, in behalf of the Technical Secretariat of the Citizen Forum of the Americas, attended to the SIRG ordinary meeting in Lima, Peru. There, she presented a resume of the main findings of the monitoring of mandates of Panama and some recommendations related to civil society participation and enabling environment (annex 25). In addition, there was a presentation in behalf of the Citizen Forum of the Americas, done by Rosario Villegas, member of the Peruvian scenario of Civil Society (annex 24).
- On March 22nd there was another presentation by Gina Romero at the SIRG meeting in Lima, in behalf of the coalition number 1 (annex 32). Previously, that morning she met with leaders of other coalitions to agree main points shared.
- The base team coordinated logistical arrangements to guarantee the participation of Consortium members and focal points.

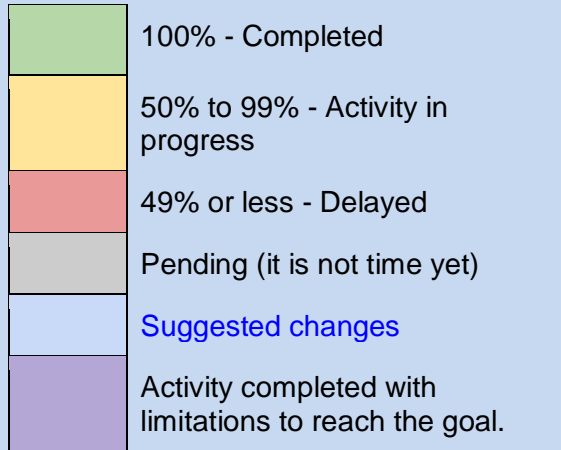

## 5. Challenges, lessons and best practices related to your project:

### Challenges

- The OAS Summit Secretariats' timetable has not been accomplished and lack of official information from them keep CSO confused about following steps to attend at the Summit. It was expected a serie of informative sessions between February 20 to 23, but it doesn't occur. Confirmation of accepted CSO at the Summit should be on March 1st, but even at the end of March some people had not information about their registration, which was required to demand Peruvian visas, buy tickets and confirm accommodation booked.
- Four countries of the Americas require Peruvian visa to attend at the Summit (Haití, Cuba, El Salvador, Nicaragua). DESCO, our consortium member talk with the Peruvian Ministry of Foreign Affairs to request facilities to allow CSO from this countries to join the Summit.
- Extemporaneous application for the Summit was a relief for those organizations which didn't it on January 20th. However the announcement was just on the night before and it would left several organizations out.
- To define a mechanism of self-management of the Citizen Forum of the Americas after the Summit and after PASCA project. The technical secretariat has been effective, but few CSO has the motivation, personnel and funding to receive that responsibility.
- Resignation of the Peruvian president on March 22nd created uncertainty about the oncoming Summit, even though the Ministry of Foreign Affairs expressed its will to continue being the host of the Summit.
- In spite of anticipated recommendations to the Summit Secretariat about the registration process, it seems to overcome them, because they took long time consolidating databases, checking it and answering to everyone. After some claims they started to communicate with coalitions' leaders, but it was not their former function. Therefore, some people miss the opportunity to track their application. In addition, there was no clear justification to require a double register with the Peruvian government. That platform was not friendly, intuitive and it presented several difficulties to be filled.

### Best practices

- Direct communication between the base team and Citizen Forum of the Americas members, focal points, coalition leaders, has strengthen confidence in PASCA process and positioned it like a trustful source of information, to solve questions about how to participate at OAS scenarios. However it is a shame that OAS directly has not clear and effective mechanisms to achieve CSO's engagement. Frequently its messages should be "translated", "explained" to be understood.
- Coalitions seem to be practical scenarios to congregate CSO toward shared purposes of incidence. it is important to develop how it could be created, coordinated and to function, to offer this information in future calls.
- Coalitions are a good scenario to prove CSO's capabilities to coordinate themselves. However, it would be great to develop a sort of guide explaining the main roles, expectations and suggestions about how to coordinate themselves.
